Jack Lyle is Retiring

We know who will take responsibility for leading the Government Documents

Unit in LIS, but who will be our in-house movie/play critic? Jack Lyle is known for his interest in film and drama, and he always has comments and critiques on the latest productions!

Jack started at ISU on July 1, 1962, after a stint in the Army in Texas and one year in the Fresno State College Library. His Bachelor's degree is from DePauw, and his first Master's degree, the MLS, is from Indiana University. After he started at ISU he earned a second Master's, in Communications.

Jack is one of the intrepid number who started in the original Cunningham Memorial Library (even before it had a special name). His advancements and changes parallel the larger system expansions.

He began in Cataloging, and he remembers when a staff member handled the typing of catalog cards. It was a big advance to move to a system in which a tape automatically printed a card set from one typed original, and the card typer only had to type the headings, not all the duplicate cards! He became one of four librarians in Reference, then Head of Circulation, and then Government Documents Librarian (part of Reference). Due to overcrowding, Documents was moved to Parsons Hall (used to be between the present Computer Center and Dreiser Hall) three years before the move to the new CML.

Jack made the "big move" in the winter of 1972-73, and became part of the newly-merged Documents and Periodicals Department, located where Periodicals and Information Resources Development and Processing (IRD&P) are now. In 1976, a reorganization saw Periodicals report to Acquisitions and Documents back as part of Reference. Three years later, due to overcrowding, Documents got to move into its own space. Jack started a CML trend that continues today: he absorbed two former study rooms for offices, and moved Documents to its present location.



In addition to moves and increasing responsibilities, Jack found time in the '60's and '70's to act in nine Community Theatre plays. These included "Arms and the Man," "Ten Little Indians," and "The Time of Your Life." He also appeared in five plays at St. Mary-of-the-Woods including "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and "The Rivals". Now that this truth is out, we can reveal that Bob Martin, Kay's husband, was also in "The Rivals!"

Jack has enjoyed the plays and other performances that have come to Terre Haute over the years. With his wife, Linda, he has also enjoyed Indianapolis activities, such as the Indianapolis Symphony, Starlight Musicals, and the Indiana Repertory Theatre.

Jack would like us all to know that he has enjoyed working with everybody at the Library all these years. What next? Sounds like he will begin his retirement rest and relaxation. He's going to buy his own PC and surf the Net, now that he has the time! - Penny Kyker
